1. Fear

Fear focuses on danger in the same way that we fear the dark and is imaginatively associated with darkness, death or injury, flashes of thunder, and the scary characters found in fairy tales, films, television, cartoons. And children have little opportunity to adapt to the situation. But as children's mental development and age increases, they can adapt to their surrounding environment.

2. Anger

Basically, a person's anger can be caused by various obstacles, for example, obstacles to the child's desired movements, obstacles to both, namely coming from other people or from their inability. Such as, obstacles to existing activities, and many more that can cause anger.

3. Jealousy

Jealousy is a normal reaction to the loss of real, imagined love, or the threatened loss of affection. Jealousy can be triggered by anger which triggers an attitude of being irritated and focused on other people. Often a pattern of jealousy arises from fear combined with anger. What can cause jealousy is that he feels neglected or second-guessed by the person he is talking to or who he loves, the condition of the school environment can also cause children to be jealous when they are in their class or school environment, other people have the same things as they have, things This often happens when children feel jealous, angry and annoyed because the items they own are the same as their friends' items.

4. Sadness

Children can feel sadness, it is a normal and common situation, but there are several reasons why children feel sadness. Parents, teachers and other adults who try to protect their children from danger or disturbances that could harm them, especially when children are still small, because children's memories are very sharp but sometimes they are easily forgotten when they get a gift or something else, replacing something. With this lost item, the

5. Curiosity

Children are usually more curious because maybe the child feels something strange and a behavior that makes him confused, maybe because someone nearby is hiding something or his behavior is different and the child wants to gain experience or wants to join other friends.

6. Joy

7. Compassion

Affection is an emotional reaction to a person or animal or object. This shows warm attention and can be manifested in physical form or verbal words.

Based on this, the family plays a major role because emotional care for children starts from the home environment. Therefore, parents must maintain behavior and attitudes in front of their children so that children do not imitate angry behavior so that children easily feel emotions. According to Blewitt et al., (2018) The following three variables can have an impact on how socially and emotionally developed kids are:

1. The heredity factor

In their book, Rini Hildayati et al. state that factors related to heredity are those that are naturally provided from birth and are passed down from parents to their offspring and grandchildren. Islam even makes reference to the significance of genetics, which is one of the key elements influencing a child's development, including their social and emotional growth.

2. Second, environmental aspects

Environmental influences are complex forces from the physical and social world that affect a child's biological makeup and psychological experiences,

including their prenatal and postnatal social and emotional experiences, according to Novan Ardy Wiyani and Barnawi. All environmental effects, such as those from the family, the school, and society, are considered environmental factors.

3. Broad Factors

Here, "common factors" refers to items that fall into the categories of the two criteria mentioned above (heredity and environmental factors). It is simple for environmental and genetic elements to coexist as common components. Gender, thyroid function, and general health are variables that can impact early childhood development. Thus, these three variables may have varying degrees of dominance on early childhood development.
